The following illustration shows how traditional astrology is being transformed through websites, mobile applications, social media communities, and digital consultations.

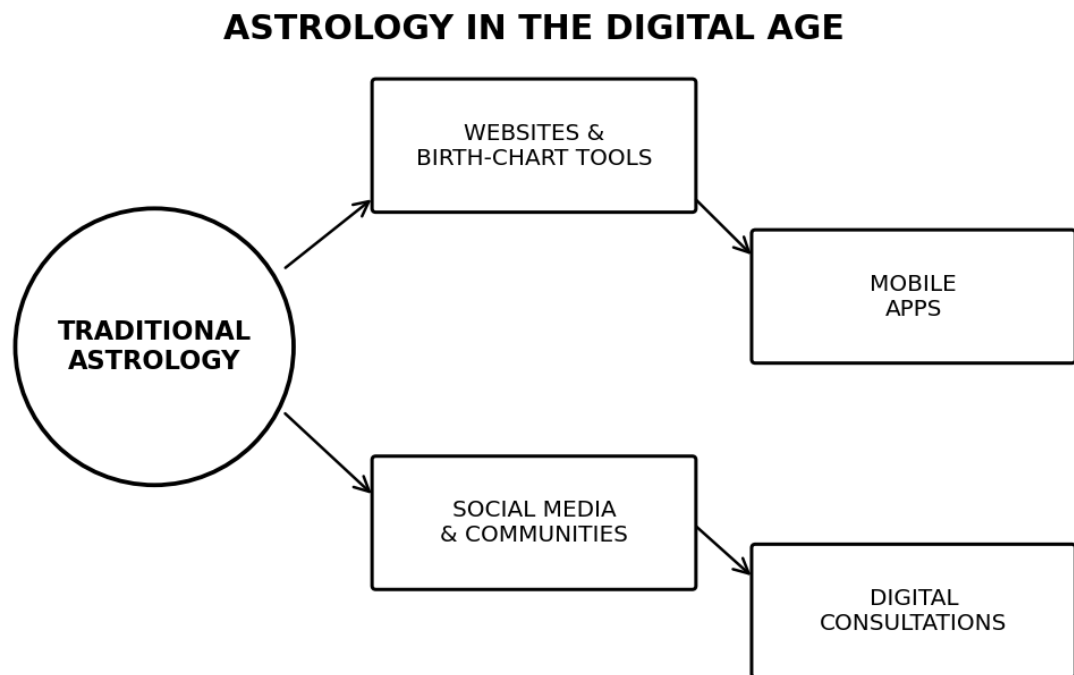


Figure 1. Transformation of traditional astrology through digital technologies.
