9. Continuity, Change, and Future Directions

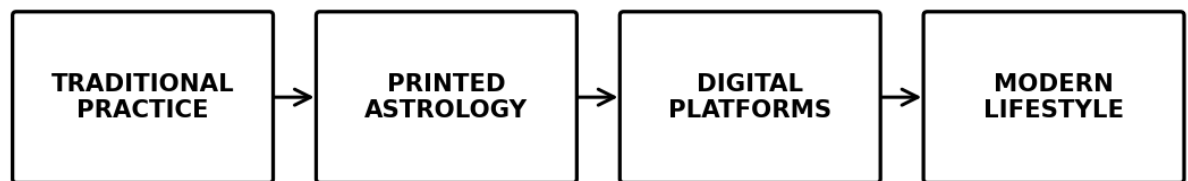
